MUSIC NOTES

Our music program is off to a fabulous start! The children are very enthusiastically playing drums, shaker eggs, and bells while learning new songs and singing and dancing with their classmates! September's focus was Active Listening. The children are learning to purposefully listen for subtle changes in pitch, tempo, and timbre. They enjoy sneaking through our pretend forest and listening for a variety of sounds as well as comparing the difference between the sound of children laughing and the sound of babies laughing. We were all laughing by the end of the lesson! October's focus is Tempo

(the speed of the beat) and in November we will focus on Timbre (pronounced "tamber"). Timbre is also known as Tone Color. It is the unique quality of an instrument's sound-- its "voice."

Timbre describes the difference between two tones played in the same pitch and volume. For example, timbre is what you observe when you decipher a piano from a guitar, or an acoustic from an electric guitar. The children may surprise you with their newly acquired listening skills—why not try it out at home? It is quite possible that the children are enjoying music class as much

WHAT IS GOING ON IN MS. GEIER'S ROOM?

We have been cooking up some Fall food fun in October, while learning about foods that come from farms, being bakers and chefs, interesting animals, and our ABCs! All of the children learned about interesting animals that begin with A, B, or C, and brought in pictures to show and tell about animals such as: Aye-ayes; Armadillos; Bats; Bactrian Camels; and Chameleons! We especially enjoyed moving like animals to "Animal Action," by Greg and Steve!

Making Muffins and Applesauce with Ms. Geier!

First we used a special tool that peels, cores, and spiral slices apples, and learned that the apples have to be firm and straight for it to work, but it was good, juicy fun anyway! Then we chopped our apple slices into pieces with plastic knives and then banged away on a food chopper to make really small pieces to cook with juice for chunky applesauce. Some of us added cinnamon. Mmmmmmm!

We also used some of our school made applesauce to make our ABC muffins! Can you guess what the three special ingredients are? Look for our recipe in this newsletter to find out! We tried two different recipes as the Pre-K class made

theirs first and the muffins came out thick and sticky instead of light and fluffy! It then became a science project after we observed our first results, made some hypothesis about what went wrong, and decided to adapt our process and ingredients for better results! Dhruv concluded that we should have used a recipe with baking soda, as his mother told him that it makes things rise up, and obviously our muffins did not! Ms. Geier had to substitute agave syrup for the sugar, and since that was trading a liquid for a solid ingredient, we thought that may have made a difference, even though we used less milk. Jack speculated that maybe it was because we put

carrots in it! We also took turns stirring the batter way too much which the next recipe told us not to do! It was really fun learning how careful bakers and chefs have to be in order to be safe and to make delicious food!

The Senior morning class had better results by using another recipe where we took turns measuring, sifting, mashing, chopping, beating, stirring, folding, and scooping, to make some fantastically healthy muffins! Julien saved the day by remembering to take them out of the oven before we went outside to play!

An Abstract Art Show in Ms. Geier's Classroom!

There are no better abstract artists than children and there was lots of proof at our Abstract Art Exhibit! The children learned that many artists express how they see, feel about, and interpret what makes up everyday life by using bold shapes or muted images, colors, lines, emotions, and many media to create very individualized works of art. Some of our favorite pieces we studied were by Andy Warhol, Henry Matisse, and Jackson Pollack. We also read "The Dot"

and "ish" by Peter H. Reynolds which help encourage children to "make their mark," explore their creativity, and celebrate their imaginations! I am proud to say that they did just that!

FROM THE TREASURER

The more information the better! A reminder that payments received more than five days past the due date will require a late payment fee.

WTPP POLICY ON ILLNESS/ABSENCE

When a child exhibits any symptoms of a contagious illness, he/she may not return to class until the child is free of symptoms (e.g., cough, frequent sneezes, sore throat, running nose, rash, and fever, enlarged glands around the neck or throat, vomiting). If any fever, vomiting, diarrhea, severe cold symptoms occur, it is imperative to observe school policy. Following this rule protects your child from being exposed to other germs while his/her resistance is down and protects

other children and staff from contracting germs. If your child contracts any communicable disease such as strep throat, chicken pox, head lice, etc., we ask you to notify your child's teacher and the program director so other parents can be informed to be alert for symptoms. Please work at home with your child on proper hand-washing. Sing "Happy Birthday" or "ABCs" or a similar song to teach children how long to wash

It was a great opportunity to work as a team and get to know parents within the WTPP family, plus it provided a needed resource for the teachers. Play dough is very easy to make and can be a fun activity to do with your children at home as well.

Here is the recipe:

2 C flour
1 C salt
4 tsp cream of tartar
1 Tbsp Vegetable oil
2 C Water
Cake decorating food coloring gels



Directions:

Add food coloring to water. Mix dry ingredients in pot. Add water and cook over low/medium heat stirring constantly until the dough sticks to itself and forms a ball. The stirring can get tough at the very end. Remove from heat and knead until smooth. Let cool completely then store in plastic bag.

FUN AND HEALTHY SNACKS

Try Ms. Geier's ABC Muffins!

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Sift the following dry ingredients together in a medium bowl:

1 ½ c flour

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt

¾ c (or less) sugar

Combine the following ingredients in a large mixing bowl:

1 egg beaten

½ c applesauce

2 bananas mashed up (we used 2 medium sized)

10 finely chopped baby carrots (one for each child in the class to chop)

1/3 c melted butter

Spray 12 count muffin tin with non-stick cooking spray or use baking cups.

Fold flour mixture into wet ingredients in large bowl until just moistened (do not over stir).

Scoop batter into muffin cups until ¾ full (an ice cream scoop works perfectly).

Bake 25-30 minutes

At WTPP, parents and teachers work in partnership to promote healthy eating habits and healthy attitudes about food. We encourage parents to help their children select healthy options to serve as snack on their special day.

PARENT'S PICKS

Partamin Nawabi shares one of her favorite places to spend time with her children: the Sterling Library and Sterling Community Center are both located at 120 Enterprise Street, Sterling, VA. There is a fenced park featuring a playground, picnic tables, and shelter. The library is small and intimate and the staff is so friendly and accessible. The library offers wonderful programs for preschoolers. Programs are widely available and accessible and usually do not fill up as other local library programs do. The community center offers a "Tot Drop-In" program for children 5 and under in an indoor gym with riding toys, balls, slides, moon bounce and more. Tot Drop-In is MWF 9:30-11:30; cost is \$2.50/session. The playground is located next to the Sterling

Volunteer Fire Company which offers sights and sounds of fire rescue to preschoolers who imagine themselves as fire fighters! Also, weekend birthday party packages are offered at the fire station:

We can spend hours enjoying the library, playground, and other programs and it's always nice to have access to shelter and indoor public restrooms, especially when we use the playground. Vunce Upon A Time by J.otto Seibold – Dagmar is an unusual vampire – a shy vegetarian who is afraid of humans! Like many children, more than he likes vegetables, Dagmar loves candy. When he learns about Halloween and the candy that humans give

out, he decides to go trick-or-treating and have a Halloween adventure!

Beastly Bath by Robert Neubecker – This is a short bedtime story full of rhymes and wonderful illustrations with a story that will encourage any reluctant child to take a "beastly bath!"

It is the goal of WTPP to provide each child, according to their own temperament and needs, with supervised play and social and emotional learning experiences with children their own age. The children will have the opportunity to learn to respect and accept the rights and also the differences of others. They will be presented with art, music, books and creative projects that are geared to their age level. Through various activities, the child will learn about the world around him and develop a feeling of belonging and security. It is the goal of WTPP to develop a child who is ready for primary school education, and complement, not replace, early learning between parent and child.

WTPP offers children a program based on the following sound education principles:

1. **Individual acceptance:** It is important for each child to be accepted as they are. Each child is helped to develop their own capabilities at their own rate of progress.
2. **Freedom within limits:** Children need to know that there are limits beyond which they cannot go. They need order to their day. They also need freedom to play – their imagination and curiosity need room to wander.
3. **A child-sized world:** Children need to find themselves in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere where they can explore, share, and play and communicate with others their own age.
4. **Parent participation:** Parents come to school regularly, not merely to visit, but to participate and to observe. The parents learn about their own children in a broader perspective. The parent can observe other adults and other methods. Through close association with professionally trained teachers, parents acquire specialized skills and greater understanding of their children and their children's peer group.
5. **Three-way sharing:** In a cooperative preschool, one finds fellowship. Child-parent-teacher sharing furthers the adult's understanding of children and facilitates the children's adjustment to their first school experience. The parents are also working together to provide the best possible preschool experience for their children at a minimum cost.
